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Chapter 1 — General Information

1-1 About this Guide

This manual provides general and operating information for the Anritsu series MG362x1A synthesized signal generator. Throughout this manual, the terms MG362x1A, signal generator, and synthesizer will be used interchangeably to refer to the instrument.

General Information 1-5 Description

1-5 Description

The series MG362x1A synthesized signal generators are microprocessor-based, synthesized signal sources with high resolution phase-lock capability. The MG362x1A is the "ideal microwave signal generator," offering frequency coverage from 9 kHz to 70 GHz and provides the lowest phase noise, leveled output power, spectral purity, switching speed, AM, FM, Phase and Pulse modulation performance, upgradability, reliability, and service. Accepts GNSS as well as accepts and provides 1600 MHz, 100 MHz, $10 \text{ MHz} \pm 100 \text{ Hz}$, 0 to 10 dBm time-base signals. Our signal generators are configurable for a broad range of applications from R&D to manufacturing and depot repair. Anritsu provides a total solution including proven reliability and standard 3 year warranty plus pre-sale and post-sale support that is the best in the industry. All functions of the signal generator are fully controllable locally from the front panel or remotely (except for power on/standby) via Ethernet (raw sockets over TCP/IP) or GPIB (IEEE-488 interface bus).

1-6 Instrument Integrity

The MG362x1A is configured for optimum signal generator performance when the instrument leaves the factory. To maintain the system's operating integrity, it is best to put the instrument into standby from the front panel before cycling power.

Antivirus Protection

The MG362x1A is tested with most common antivirus software, but stability is not guaranteed with all antivirus software. Anritsu recommends connecting the instrument only to a secure network. The user assumes the responsibility to provide virus protection because this is not supplied with the instrument. Contact your network administrator for information about your network security and antivirus protection policies.

1-7 ESD Caution General Information

1-7 ESD Caution

Connection of coaxial cables carrying an electrostatic potential, excess power, or excess voltage can damage the internal circuitry of the signal generator. Operators must be aware of the potential for ESD damage and take all necessary precautions. Operators should exercise practices outlined within industry standards such as JEDEC-625 (EIA-625), MIL-HDBK-263, and MIL-STD-1686, which pertain to ESD and ESDS devices, equipment, and practices. Because these apply to the MG362x1A, Anritsu recommends that any static charges that may be present be dissipated before connecting coaxial cables to the signal generator. It is important to remember that the operator may also carry a static charge. Following the practices outlined in the referenced standards will ensure a safe environment for both personnel and equipment.

1-8 Instrument Care and Preventive Maintenance

The MG362x1A signal generator care and preventive maintenance consists of cleaning the unit and inspecting and cleaning the RF connectors on the instrument and all accessories. Clean the signal generator with a soft, lint-free cloth dampened with water or water and a mild cleaning solution.

Caution To avoid damaging the display or covers, do not use solvents or abrasive cleaners.

Cleaning the Fan Grill

The signal generator must always receive adequate ventilation. A blocked fan grill can cause the instrument to overheat and shut down. Clean the fans as follows:

- 1. Disconnect the MG362x1A from the power source.
- 2. Carefully vacuum the fan filters from the outside to clean them.

Connector Care

Power Output

The MG362x1A is capable of output s in excess of +30 dBm. Ensure that proper care is taken to protect sensitive power sensors from being damaged by using a fixed attenuator.

1-9 Unpacking the Product

Inspect the shipping container for damage. Retain the shipping container or cushioning material if they are damaged until the contents of the shipment have been checked against the packing and the signal generator has been checked for specified operation. If the shipment is incomplete or if the signal generator is damaged mechanically or electrically, notify your local sales representative or Anritsu Customer Service. If either the shipping container is damaged or the cushioning material shows signs of stress, notify the carrier as well as Anritsu. Keep the shipping materials for the carrier's inspection.

1-10 Operating Environment

Before installing the MG362x1A in its operating environment, ensure that all airflow passages at the sides and rear of the instrument are clear. Proper ventilation is of particular importance whenever the unit is being rack mounted. See the MG362x1A Technical Data Sheet for environmental requirements (11410-00928).

1-11 Typographic Conventions

Sequential menu successions are presented as a string of actions separated with a vertical pipe. For example, to trigger a level-sweep:

Press: SWEEP | LEVEL | TRIGGER

1-12 Preparation for Storage/Shipment

The following paragraphs give instructions for preparing the MG362x1A for storage or shipment.

Preparation for Storage

Preparing the signal generator for storage consists of cleaning the unit, packing the inside with moisture-absorbing desiccant crystals, and storing the unit in a temperature environment that is maintained between -40°C and +75°C.

Preparation for Shipment

To provide maximum protection against damage in transit, the signal generator should be repackaged in the original shipping container. If this container is no longer available and the unit is being returned to Anritsu for repair, advise Anritsu Customer Service; they will send a new shipping container free of charge. In the event neither of these two options is possible, instructions for packaging and shipment are detailed on the next page.

Use a Suitable Container

Obtain a corrugated cardboard carton with a 125 kg test strength. This carton should have inside dimensions of no less than 15 cm larger than the unit dimensions to allow for cushioning.

Cushion the Instrument

Cushion the instrument on all sides by tightly packing dunnage or urethane foam between the carton and the unit. Provide at least three inches of dunnage on all sides. Surround the unit with polyethylene sheeting to protect the finish.

Seal the Container

Seal the carton by using either shipping tape or an industrial stapler.

Address the Container

If the instrument is being returned to Anritsu for service, mark the address of the appropriate Anritsu service center and your return address on the carton in one or more prominent locations.

All Anritsu instruments are assigned a unique six-digit ID number, such as "020312". The ID number is imprinted on a decal that is affixed to the rear panel of the unit. Special-order instrument configurations also have an additional special number tag attached to the rear panel of the unit, such as SM1234.

When ordering parts or corresponding with Anritsu Customer Service, please use the correct serial number with reference to the specific instrument's model number.

Chapter 2 — Instrument Overview


2-1 Introduction

This chapter provides an overview of the Anritsu MG362x1A signal generator. It describes the instrument hardware features, touch screen display, general system settings and instrument configurations, and the connector panels.

2-2 Front Panel

The MG362x1A front panel consists of the Graphical User Interface (GUI) and the data entry area.

The following sections provide a brief description of the front panel controls and data entry areas shown in Figure 2-1. See Section 2-7 "GUI Overview" on page 2-12.



- 1. Power Button: Press the power button to power the signal generator on and off. Standby (off) is indicated by the white illuminated power button; Operate (on) is indicated by the green illuminated power button.
- 2. Model Identification Label: Identifies the model type and frequency range.
- 3. LCD Display: The LCD display provides information about the current status of the MG362x1A in a menu display format. This information includes the operating mode of the instrument and the value of the active frequency and parameters. The display functions as a touch-screen interface to provide access to graphical button controls and additional setting menus.
- 4. Front Panel Buttons: The front panel buttons provide controls for changing parameter values.
- 5. RF Output Control Key: The RF output control key turns the RF output power on and off. Output Off is indicated by an orange LED; Output On is indicated by a green LED.
- 6. RF Output Connector: The RF output connector provides the 50 Ω RF signal output. Before making connections to the RF output connector, see "Torque Requirements" on page 2-3.
- 7. Front Panel BNCs: Available with Option 29. Input BNCs are AM IN, FM/ΦM IN, Pulse IN, External ALC IN).
- 8. Handles: Standard configuration includes handles.
- 9. USB Interface: Four front panel Type A USB Inputs.

2-2 Front Panel Instrument Overview

Front Panel Controls

Use the numeric keypad, arrow hard buttons, or rotary data knob to change the MG362x1A parameter value. The data entry area is shown in Figure 2-2 and described in the following paragraphs.



- 1. Menu Hard Keys

Menu Buttons

Frequency: Press to access the frequency menu.

Level: Press to access the level menu.

ALT: Non-Functional

Rotary Knob

Use the rotary knob to change the value of a parameter that is open for editing. The cursor is moved under the open parameter using the left or right pad cursor control pads. Turn the rotary knob clockwise to increase the parameter or counterclockwise to decreased by the parameter unit size. The unit size is determined by the cursor placement. Turn the knob rapidly changes the value in larger steps.

When editing frequency and time parameters, the incremental size can be set to using the system configuration increment menu. Refer to "Press < Previous to return to the main Configure RF menu display.INCREMENT Menu" on page 3-100. Once set, each time the knob is turned clockwise or counter-clockwise, the parameter's value increases or decreases by the set unit amount.

Cursor Control Pad

The left and right pads control the direction of the cursor when editing a parameter. Press the left keypad to move the cursor left to edit an open parameter. Press the right keypad to move the cursor right to edit an open parameter. Press the top keypad to increase a units value, Press the bottom keypad to decrease the units value. Press and hold will allow the selected parameter to continually increase or decrease. Press Select to enter an opened single terminator value.

Instrument Overview 2-2 Front Panel

Numeric Keypad

The numeric keypad provides for entering frequency, time, number-of-steps, modulation parameters, and GPIB address values. The "+/-" key functions as a "change sign" key during any keypad entry.

RF Output

The front panel output connector panel is described in Figure 2-3.

Torque Requirements

To avoid connector damage or inaccurate measurements, review document 10100-00031Connector Care Reference before making any connections.

N-Type Connector: Torque to 0.9 N-M (8in-lb) for standard N connectors using Anritsu Model 01-203 13/16 in Torque End Wrench.

K (2.92 mm) Connector: Torque to 0.9 Nm (8 lbf in) using Anritsu Model 01-201 5/16 in Torque End Wrench and Anritsu Model 01-204 - 8 mm (5/16 in) Open End Wrench.

V Connector: Torque to 0.9 Nm (8 lbf in) using Anritsu Model 01-201 5/16 in Torque End Wrench and Anritsu Model 01-204 - 8 mm (5/16 in) Open End Wrench.



Unleveled Indicator: The unleveled indicator is displayed when the RF output goes unleveled and is normally caused by exceeding the specified leveled power rating.

RF On/Off: Press to manually turn RF output on or RF output off.

RF Output Connector: The female RF output connector. The 50 Ω output connector is:

K for the 20 GHz model MG36221A

K for the MG36241A model V for the MG36271A model

CAUTION Label: The output power may exceed +30 dBm. Attenuate output power as necessary to protect RF test equipment from excessive output power when connecting to the output connector.


2-3 Rear Panel

Rear Panel BNCs




Figure 2-4. Rear Panel BNCs

The MG362x1A rear panel BNCs are described in Figure 2-4.

AM OUT: Provides the amplitude modulation waveform from the internal LF generator. Enabled with Option 027. (BNC type, rear panel)

HORIZ OUT: Provides 0 V at beginning and +10 V at end of sweep, regardless of sweep width. In CW mode, the voltage is proportional to frequency between 0 V at low end and +10 V at the high end of the range. In CW mode, if CW RAMP is enabled, a repetitive, 0 V to +10 V ramp is provided.(BNC type, rear panel)

PULSE OUT: Provides a video modulating signal from the internal pulse generator. Enabled with Option 027. (BNC type, rear panel)

FM OUT: Provides the frequency or phase modulation waveform from the internal LF generator. Enabled with Option 027. (BNC type, rear panel)

EXT TRIG: Accepts a TTL low-level signal of 1 μs width to trigger a sweep. (BNC type, rear panel)

PULSE SYNC: Provides a TTL compatible signal, synchronized to the internal pulse modulation output. Enabled with Option 026. (BNC type, rear panel)

LOCKED/LEVELED: TTL high/low output signal when in internal ALC mode that is a logical AND of frequency locked condition and output leveled condition. When in Fixed Gain mode this signal indicates only frequency locked/unlocked condition. (BNC type, rear panel)

PPS: 1PPS input/output from either GNSS atomic clock receiver or internal rubidium reference option. (3.3V CMOS I/O, BNC type, rear panel)

FM IN: Accepts an external signal to frequency or phase modulate the RF output signal. Enabled with Option 012. 50Ω impedance. (BNC type, rear panel)

EXT ALC: Provides for leveling the RF output signal externally with either a detector or power meter. Signal requirements are shown in the RF Output specifications. (BNC type, rear panel)

EFC: ± 4 VDC 30 Hz bandwidth in wide reference PLL mode 1 MΩ input impedance. Provides the capability to frequency modulate the internal crystal oscillator, allowing phase locking of the synthesizer inside an external lock loop. (BNC type, rear panel)

AM IN: Accepts an external signal to amplitude modulate the RF output signal. Enabled with Option 012. 50 Ω impedance. (BNC type, rear panel)

10 MHZ REF IN: Accepts an external 10 MHz \pm 3 Hz, 0 dBm to +10 dBm (20 dBm no-damage level) time-base signal. Automatically disconnects the internal high-stability time-base option, if connected. 50 Ω impedance input (BNC type, rear panel)

10 MHZ REF OUT: Provides a 10 dBm, AC coupled, signal derived from the internal frequency standard. 50 Ω impedance, SMA type, rear panel

PULSE IN: Accepts an external TTL compatible signal to pulse modulate the RF output signal or to trigger or to gate the optional internal pulse generator. Enabled with Option 026. (BNC type, rear panel)

100 MHZ REF IN: Accepts an external 100 MHz \pm 200 Hz or 2 ppm 12 \pm 1 dBm (20 dBm no-damage level) reference signal. Enabled with Option 003 or 013. Automatically disconnects the internal high-stability time-base option, if connected. (50 Ω impedance, SMA type, rear panel

100 MHZ REF OUT: Provides a 12 dBm, AC coupled, 100 MHz signal derived from the internal frequency standard. Enabled with Option 003 or 013. (50 Ω impedance, SMA type, rear panel

1600 MHZ REF IN: Accepts an external 1600 MHz \pm 3.2 kHz or 2 ppm, 4 \pm 1 dBm (20 dBm no-damage level) reference signal. Enabled with Option 003 or 013. Automatically disconnects the internal high-stability time-base option, if connected. (50 Ω impedance, SMA type, rear panel


1600 MHZ OUT: Provides a 5 dBm, AC coupled, 1600 MHz signal derived from the internal frequency standard. Enabled with Option 003 or 013. (50 Ω impedance, SMA type, rear panel

GNSS/GPS: Accepts GPS antenna input.





2-4 Installation and Power Requirements

The signal generator accepts 90 to 264 VAC, 47 Hz to 63 Hz, single-phase, AC mains input power. The signal generator is intended for Installation Category (Over Voltage Category) II. To connect the MG362x1A to the power source, plug the female end of the power cable into the input line voltage receptacle on the rear panel as shown in Figure 2-5. Then plug the male end of the power cord into a three-wire power line outlet. Turn on the rear panel power button. This automatically places the signal generator in operation (front panel Operate LED on).


Warning



When supplying power to this equipment, always use a three-wire power cable connected to a three-wire power line outlet. If power is supplied without grounding the equipment in this manner, there is a risk of receiving a severe or fatal electric shock.

2-5 Powering On the MG362x1A

Connect the MG362x1A to an AC power source. Turn on the rear panel power button as shown in Figure 2-5. This automatically places the signal generator into operation (front panel green Operate LED on). During power on and power down, the orange LED blinks for five to ten seconds.

Power on the signal generator. The front panel display is shown as in Figure 2-6 during power-on. The power on sequence shows the loading internal programs status-bar, the model number of the signal generator, the options installed, and the revision level of the installed firmware. When complete, the MG362x1A then returns to the same configuration it was in when last set to Standby.

Standby Mode

Whenever the signal generator is not being used, it should be left connected to the power source and placed in standby. Standby mode provides power to keep the internal time base at operating temperature. This assures specified frequency accuracy and stability when the MG362x1A is placed in operation.

Warm-up Time

After placing the MG362x1A into operation mode, allow 30 minutes of warm-up time to ensure stable operation.

From a cold start (0 °C), the signal generator requires approximately 120 hours (5 days) of warm-up to achieve specified frequency stability with aging.

Note

The Ref Cold message may appear on the MG362x1A user interface task bar when the instrument is first powered on from a cold condition. The message may be displayed for a few minutes until the lock circuitry has reached the operational temperature. This warning message may display for units with Option 3, 13, 23, 56, and 66.

Note

Instruments disconnected from AC power for more than 72 hours require 30 days to return to specified aging.





The title bar is located at the top of the interface screen. It displays icons that provide access to information and user actions as described below. All of the icons are active and will open the appropriate menu or item when touched.



- 1. Press the 3-line icon to display the "System Menu" on page 2-22. The instrument model and its serial number are also displayed.
- 2. Press the camera icon to capture a screen shot of the current display. The image file is saved in PNG format with the following naming scheme: screenshot_yymmdd_hhmmss.png (year, month, day, hour, minute, second). Using the "SCREENSHOT Settings" on page 2-34, you can set the screen capture region, color theme, annotations, and destination directory.
- 3. Notifications are generated when an error is detected or an activity such as a screen shot has taken place. The number of unread notifications appears next to the icon. The notification area is where all dynamic notifications are presented. These notifications are generally information messages to the user and not hardware failure messages. Press the icon to display the Notifications list.
- 4. Displayed when a USB device is attached. To ensure the device or it's data does not become corrupted, press this icon to eject the USB device before it is unplugged from the USB port.
- 5. Displays the active internal reference. Press the GPS icon to view the "GPS/GNSS Settings" on page 2-32.
- 6. The right side of the instrument title bar displays the system date and time. Pressing this field opens the "DATE TIME Settings" on page 2-36.






Figure 2-12. Frequency Menu Display

Opening a Parameter




Figure 2-13. Edit Parameter

Open a parameter for editing by pressing a function from the main menu. In the following example, to open the frequency function, press FREQUENCY. The menu display changes to show that the frequency parameter has been opened as shown in Figure 2-13. The highlighted digit shows the active unit set for change. To change the unit value, see below for "Cursor Control Buttons".

Cursor Control Buttons

The cursor buttons control the movement of the cursor on the display. When a parameter is opened for editing, a cursor highlights the open parameter. Each time the right or left pad is pressed, the cursor moves left or right by one digit. The up or down pad can then be used to increase or decrease the value of the parameter. The unit size of the increase or decrease that occurs each time the up or down pad is pressed is determined by the cursor position. Only one parameter can be opened at a time.

In addition, when editing frequency and time parameters, the incremental size can be set to a specific value. Once set and activated, each time the up or down pad is pressed, the parameter's value increases or decreases by the set amount. The cursor does not appear with the increment mode is toggled ON. See "Press < Previous to return to the main Configure RF menu display.INCREMENT Menu" on page 3-100.

Editing the Parameter

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


Figure 2-14. Edit Parameter Display

To modify a numeric parameter setting that is displayed on a menu or edit window, press the unit to make it active. Edit the parameter by using the numeric keypad, arrow buttons, or rotary data knob to change the value as shown in Figure 2-14.

Use a termination buttons to close the window. The termination buttons are described in "Termination Buttons" on page 2-19.

Termination Buttons

Termination buttons are used to terminate keypad data entries and change the parameter values in memory. As shown on the left, termination soft buttons are located on the right side of the menu display. If the entered value is outside the allowable range of the open parameter, an error message will be displayed along with an audible "beep." This example displays frequency termination buttons in the left-side settings menu.

Frequency: GHz/MHz/kHz/Hz/mHz Level: dB/dBm/dB/mV (in log mode)

Time: Sec/ms/ms/ns

BACKSPACE: The back space button is used to correct keypad data entry errors by deleting the last number, "—", or decimal point entered.

CLEAR: When a parameter is open for editing, the clear entry button is used to clear the parameter entry.

ESC: Clears the data entry and the previous parameter is displayed.

Entering a New Value

To change the current value of a parameter by entering a new value for the parameter, use the data entry keypad and termination buttons.

Press the parameter to be edited. Enter the new value for the parameter, then press the appropriate terminator button. If the entered value is outside the allowable range of the open parameter, the entry is not accepted and the previous value for the parameter is displayed.

Numeric Entry Buttons

The numerical values. The +/- button changes the sign of the numerical value during data entry. The SELECT button enters the value that is currently displayed in the parameter entry field.

Invalid Entries

When setting parameters or entering other types of data, if an entry is out of range or is otherwise invalid, an audible beep will be sound and may provide a message indicating a invalid range. In this case, clear or cancel the entry and enter a valid value or change the units by using either the drop-down selection next to the data entry window, or with the unit terminators to the left of the keypad.

Using a Set Increment

When editing frequency and time parameters, you can increase or decrease the parameter's value by a set amount each time the arrow buttons are pressed or the rotary data knob to increase or decrease the value. For instructions on setting the increment size, refer to "Press < Previous to return to the main Configure RF menu display.INCREMENT Menu" on page 3-100.

Text Entry

When an instrument function requires test to be entered, such as entering an Ethernet hostname, a touch screen alphabetic keyboard is displayed. See Figure 2-15. The insertion point can be moved to a touched position in the data entry field. Enable caps-lock by double tapping the shift button.




Figure 2-16. Touch Screen EZ Keyboard




Figure 2-17. Touch Screen EZ Keyboard


Figure 2-18. Touch Screen EZ Keyboard











Figure 2-23. SETTINGS Menu





Network Settings

The MG362x1A fully supports the IEEE-802.3 standard. Most MG362x1A front panel functions (except power on/off) can be remotely controlled via a network server and an Ethernet connection. The MG362x1A software supports the TCP/IP network protocol.

Ethernet uses a bus or star topology where all of the interfacing devices are connected to a central cable (bus), or are connected to a hub. Ethernet uses the CSMA/CD access method to handle simultaneous transmissions over the bus. CSMA/CD stands for *Carrier Sense Multiple Access/Collision Detection*. This standard enables network devices to detect simultaneous data channel usage, called a *collision*, and provides for a contention protocol. When a network device detects a collision, the CSMA/CD standard dictates that the data will be retransmitted after waiting a random amount of time. If a second collision is detected, the data is again retransmitted after waiting twice as long.

The TCP/IP setup requires the following:

- IP Address: Every computer/electronic device in a TCP/IP network requires an IP address. An IP address has four numbers (each between 0 and 255) separated by periods. For example: 128.111.122.42 is a valid IP address.
- Subnet Mask: The subnet mask distinguishes the portion of the IP address that is the network ID from the portion that is the station ID. The subnet mask 255.255.0.0, when applied to the IP address given above, would identify the network ID as 128.111 and the station ID as 122.42. All stations in the same local area network should have the same network ID, but different station IDs.
- Default Gateway: A TCP/IP network can have a gateway to communicate beyond the LAN identified by the network ID. A gateway is a computer or electronic device that is connected to two different networks and can move TCP/IP data from one network to the other. A single LAN that is not connected to other LANs requires a default gateway setting of 0.0.0.0. If you have a gateway, then the default gateway would be set to the appropriate value of your gateway
- Ethernet Address: An Ethernet address is a unique 48-bit value that identifies a network interface card to the rest of the network. Every network card has a unique Ethernet address permanently stored into its memory. Remote programming and operation between the instrument and remote program is accomplished via a TCP/IP raw socket connection to port 9001. The remote program must establish a TCP/IP raw socket connection at port 9001 to the MG362x1A.

- The remote program may connect to the instrument IP address or to its HOSTNAME (Ethernet only). If using DHCP instead of a static IP, using the HOSTNAME may be more reliable for finding an instrument on a network.
- You may need to contact your network administrator to ensure network security policies, anti-virus, and firewall settings do not block access to the controlling computer and its ports.

Interface between the signal generator and other devices on the network is via a category five (CAT-5) interface cable connected to a network. This cable uses four twisted pairs of copper insulators terminated into an RJ45 connector. CAT-5 cabling is capable of supporting frequencies up to 100 MHz and data transfer speeds up to 1 Gbps, which accommodates 1000Base-T, 100Base-T, and 10Base-T networks. CAT-5 cables are based on the EIA/TIA 568 Commercial Building Telecommunications Wiring Standard developed by the Electronics Industries Association.

The instrument can be remotely programmed using the raw sockets over TCP/IP protocol. The NI-VISA™ I/O library is used on the server side to facilitate the communications. The SCPI or MG362x1A command sets listed in the MG362x1A programming manual (10370-10385) applies to LAN programming as well.

To run the following example, you must have NI-VISA 2.5 or later installed on the controller PC and you must select the VISA library (visa32.dll) as a reference in a Visual Basic project. Both the MG362x1A instrument and the host PC must be connected to the network.



Network Connection

CAT-5 cabling is capable of supporting frequencies up to 100 MHz and data transfer speeds up to 1 Gbps, which accommodates 1000Base-T, 100Base-T, and 10Base-T networks. CAT-5 cables are based on the EIA/TIA 568 Commercial Building Telecommunications Wiring Standard developed by the Electronics Industries Association. A pinout diagram is shown in Table 2-4.

Integrated into the RJ45 connector are two LEDs. The amber LED indicates the presence of LAN voltages (a live LAN connection) while the green LED flashes to show that LAN traffic is present. The instrument IP address and its hostname are set via the System menu (upper left corner) and accessing the ETHERNET or WIFI settings menu.

TCP/IP connectivity requires setting up the parameters described at the beginning of this section. The following is a brief overview of how to set up a general LAN connection on the MG362x1A.

Note

You may need to consult your network documentation or network administrator for assistance in configuring your network setup.

2-14 Connecting to the MG362x1A or Localhost

Connecting to a networked instrument or to the localhost is established via the system menu. If connecting to an instrument, the instrument must first be connected to the network via Ethernet or WiFi and the IP address of the instrument must be known.

Working with the Localhost

The localhost setting provides a simulated connection to the instrument hardware, but does not provide simulated data. When an instrument is not connected and the MG362x1A software instead connects with the localhost, most of the menus are available and operate the same as they do on the instrument, but there are some differences. In order to analyze measurement data, this data must first be acquired using instrument hardware and then saved locally to the PC or transferred to the PC from instrument storage at a later time.

Measurement Setup Parameters

Since most of the setup parameters are available, you can use the PC software to create measurement setup files (.stp) for later use on the instrument; however, when recalling and analyzing measurement data, changing settings that would affect the data acquisition may cause the recalled data to be removed from the display. For example, you can change amplitude parameters, but you cannot change frequency parameters such as start/stop, span, and bandwidth parameters since there would be no data associated with those changed parameters. You can apply measurement features to the saved measurement data such as markers and limit lines and you can change many measurement and view settings. Opening a .fmxxxx measurement file when connected to the localhost will work basically the same as recalling a measurement on an instrument.

2-15 REMOTE Settings

The MG362x1A provides automated signal generator operation via the GPIB, Ethernet, and USB remote interfaces. The following paragraphs provide information about the interface connections, cable requirements, and setting up the remote operating parameters.

GPIB Interface Connection and Setup

Interface between the signal generator and other devices on the GPIB is via a 24-wire interface cable. This cable uses connector shells having two connector faces. These double-faced connectors allow for the parallel connection of two or more cables to a single device. The only interconnection required for GPIB operation is between the signal generator and the controller. This interconnection is via a standard GPIB cable. The Anritsu part number for GPIB cables of proper length is 2100-1, -2, or -4 (1, 2, or 4 meters in length).

The GPIB can accommodate up to 15 instruments at any one time. To achieve design performance on the bus, proper timing and voltage level relationships must be maintained. If either the cable length between separate instruments or the cumulative cable length between all instruments is too long, the data and control lines cannot be driven properly and the system may fail to perform.

Cable length restrictions: No more than 15 instruments installed on the bus and the total cumulative cable length (in meters) may not exceed two times the number of bus instruments or 20 meters—whichever is less.


Note

For low EMI applications, all cables should be a fully shielded type with well-grounded metal-shell connectors.

The default GPIB address is five as shown in Figure 2-27. To change the GPIB address:

Press: 3-Line Icon | REMOTE | GPIB PRIMARY ADDRESS

Type the new GPIB address and then press the ENTER button.



GPIB: Set the GPIB preferences.

GPIB PRIMARY ADRESS: Select the address of the MG362x1A on the bus. Enter a new address, between one and 30. The new GPIB address will appear on the display.

GPIB OUTPUT TERMINATOR: Select the carriage return (CR) or a carriage return and line feed (LF) or (CR/LF) as the GPIB data delimiter. Consult the GPIB controller's manual to determine which data delimiter is required.

SYSTEM OPTIONS: Set the REMOTE system options

SYSTEM LANGUAGE: Set the remote language as SCPI Native or Tmsl ('Tmsl is an alias for SCPI). Entering either will return SCPI when queried.

MODEL OVERRIDE: Changes the "*IDN?" response to the appropriate model in the selected family as MG3690A, MG3690B, or MG3690C.

GPS/GNSS Settings

The MG362x1A signal generator is available with a built-in global positioning receiver feature (Option 66) that can provide latitude, longitude, altitude, and UTC timing information. This option also enhances frequency reference oscillator accuracy. When the global positioning receiver is actively locked to satellites, this information is saved with all saved measurements. The MG362x1A supports the following global positioning satellite systems:

- **GPS:** The United States Global Positioning System (GPS). GPS is currently the world's most utilized satellite navigation system.
- **GNSS**: Global Navigation Satellite System, a term used worldwide. This term includes GPS, GLONASS, and Galileo. Accessing multiple satellites provides increased accuracy, redundancy, and availability at all times.

Activating the GPS Feature

Attach the GPS antenna to the GPS connector on the top of the instrument.

- 1. Access the System menu from the "3-Line Icon" in the upper left corner.
- 2. Press SETTINGS to access the instrument settings menu, then select GPS to open the GPS settings and info window.




Figure 2-28. GPS Settings

- **3.** Activate the GPS by sliding the GPS/GNSS toggle to on.
- 4. Set ANTENNA VOLTAGE to 3.3 or 5.0V.
- **5.** When the GPS receiver has established a "good fix", the GPS icon is displayed with a center dot and the following information is kept updated:
 - Fix status
 - · Tracked satellites
 - Latitude
 - Longitude
 - Altitude
 - UTC timing information

After GPS location fix is attained, the internal reference oscillator begins to correct its frequency to match the GPS standard. Within three minutes of satellite acquisition, the reference oscillator will have an accuracy of better than 25 ppb (parts per billion). The OCXO internal standard accuracy is ± 0.3 PPM. The correction factor applied to the internal OCXO allows the instrument to maintain GPS frequency accuracy for three days at better than 50 ppb, even when the instrument is obstructed from receiving signals from the GPS satellites.

In order to acquire data from the GPS satellites, you must have line-of-sight to the satellites, or the antenna must be placed outside with no obstructions.







Figure 2-30. Screenshot Preview




Figure 2-32. Options Settings




Figure 2-35. File Management Icons (2 of 2)




Figure 2-36. DIAGNOSTICS Menu




Figure 2-37. EVENT LOG




Figure 2-38. SELF TEST Pass




Figure 2-39. SELF TEST Failed

The self test results can be saved to a file for future reference.

Pass: Pass is displayed when all self testing measurements pass, the Overall Status and SYSTEM would display "pass".




Figure 2-40. Self Test Status Log




Figure 2-41. SERVICE Menu




Figure 2-42. TOOLS-DISCOVERY Menu

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Chapter 3 — Instrument Operation

3-1 Introduction

This chapter provides a brief overview of the Anritsu MG362x1A signal generator real-time operation and to provide a starting point for making basic measurement setups. This chapter describes general instrument operation including setting frequency, power level, modulation, sweep applications, and system configurations.

3-2 Power-on Display




Figure 3-1. Startup Display Screen

During power-on, the following screen is displayed as shown in Figure 3-1 The display shows the model number, software version installed, and the options installed. The progress bar displays the system power up and loading sequence status.

3-3 Standby Mode

Whenever the signal generator is not being used, it should be left connected to the power source and placed in standby mode. Standby mode provides power to keep the internal time base at operating temperature to help ensure specified frequency accuracy and stability when the MG362x1A is placed back into operation.

Note

When switching to operate from standby, allow at least a 30-minute warm-up before beginning signal generator operations.

3-4 Self Testing the MG362x1A

The MG362x1A firmware includes internal diagnostics that self test the instrument. These self-test diagnostics perform a brief functionality test of most of the PCBs and other internal assemblies. For more on performing self test and viewing the results, see Appendix D.

Caution

During self test with RF OUTPUT set to ON, the output power level is set to 0 dBm. Always disconnect sensitive equipment from the unit before performing self test.

3-5 Resetting to Default Parameters

Reset the MG362x1A to the factory selected default parameter values at any time during normal operation.

Note

Resetting the instrument clears the current setup parameters. If these parameter values are needed for future testing, save them as a stored setup **before** resetting the signal generator. For information on saving and recalling instrument setups, refer to "Saving Setups" on page 3-86.

Factory Reset will delete the last saved settings, restore all the settings to their factory default vales and will restart the signal generator.

To reset the signal generator:

Press: 3-Line Icon | SETTINGS | RESET | RESET ALL




Figure 3-2. System Menu - Reset All

FREQUENCY Menu




Figure 3-3. Frequency Menu

The signal generator produces discrete CW frequencies across the frequency range of the instrument. The FREQUENCY menu is shown in Figure 3-3. Refer to the following sections for FREQUENCY setting and operation.

FREQUENCY: Press to type or edit a CW frequency.

MG36221A Frequency Range: 9kHz to 20.0 GHz MG36241A Frequency Range: 9kHz to 43.5 GHz MG36271A Frequency Range: 9kHz to 70.0 GHz

LEVEL: Press to type or edit a power level.

Range: –130 dBm to 33 dBm with step attenuator: –20 to 33 dBm without step attenuator

COPY TO LIST: Copies the set frequency and level parameters to the LIST menu. See "LIST Menu" on page 3-22.

ENABLE CW MODE: When pressed, CW mode is enabled. If a sweep is in progress, pressing ENABLE CW MODE will stop the sweep and CW mode will be enabled.

PRESETS: Press to type or edit a CW Frequency in the Presets list. Press the pencil icon to edit an F0 - F9 preset frequency, or select the PRESETS menu from the right column of the Frequency menu. See the "FREQUENCY PRESETS Menu" on page 3-7.

Edit the CW Frequency

To select a CW frequency for output, edit the current frequency, enter a new frequency, or select one of the preset frequency parameters from the PRESET menu. To place the MG362x1A in the CW frequency mode, go to the main menu:




Figure 3-4. Frequency Entry

The frequency edit window is displayed as shown in Figure 3-4. Enter new CW frequency or edit the current CW frequency using the cursor control keys, the rotary data knob, or the front panel keypad and the appropriate terminator button. If a parameter was selected in error and no editing is required, click outside the active window or click a terminator to close.





Figure 3-5. Frequency Entered

Once a CW frequency has been entered into the field, press a terminator button and then press outside the entry window to show the frequency in the LCD display as shown in Figure 3-5.

Phase Offset Menu


Figure 3-6. PHASE OFFSET Menu

The Phase Offset menu is shown in Figure 3-6. The phase offset function is available in CW operating mode only. When active, the MG362x1A RF output will be phase shifted by the specified amount displayed in the phase offset parameter. The phase offset range is -360° to +360° with a resolution of 0.1°. When the phase offset is on, the phase offset value is displayed in the CW menu. To zero the phase offset display from the phase offset menu, press Zero Display.



PHASE OFFSET: Set the phase offset range from -360 to 360°.

STATE: Set the phase offset to on or off. **ZERO**: Set the phase offset to zero (0°).



Analog Sweep (Option 6)




Figure 3-9. Analog Sweep

The Analog Sweep menu is shown in Figure 3-9. In analog sweep frequency mode, the MG36221A's output frequency is swept between selected start and stop frequencies. Sweep width can be set from 1 MHz to the full frequency range of the signal generator. Sweep time can be set for any time in the range of 13 ms to 99 sec. The lower frequency limit for analog sweeps is 10 MHz.

When the sweep width of the analog sweep is >100 MHz, the sweep is phase-lock corrected at both the start and stop frequencies and at each band switch point. When the sweep width is \leq 100 MHz, only the center frequency is phase-lock corrected.

Editing the Current Start/Stop Frequencies

To edit the current frequency sweep range, open either the start or stop frequency parameter field. In the display shown in Figure 3-13, press START opens the start frequency parameter. Press STOP opens the stop frequency parameter. Edit the open frequency parameters. When complete, close the open parameter using a termination key.

Setting PRESET SWEEP RANGES

To set the sweep range frequency parameters:

Press: SWEEP | STEP | PRESET SWEEP RANGES

The Sweep Range menu is shown in Figure 3-14.

- **Press F1-F2:** Provides a frequency sweep between the start frequency, F1, and the stop frequency, F2.
- Press F3-F4: Provides a frequency sweep between the start frequency, F3, and the stop frequency, F4.
- **Press F5-DF:** Provides a symmetrical frequency sweep about the center frequency, F5. The sweep width is determined by the dF frequency parameter.
- **Press F6-DF:** Provides a symmetrical frequency sweep about the center frequency, F6. The sweep width is determined by the dF frequency parameter. The Delta Frequency can be applied to any F0-F9 frequency.

Selecting one of the preset sweep range parameters F1-F2, F3-F4, F5-F6 and DF (Delta Frequency).

Setting Sweep Time

To set the analog sweep time, press SWEEP TIME.

Edit the current sweep time using the cursor control keys, the rotary data knob, or enter a new sweep time using the key pad and appropriate termination key. To close the open sweep time parameter once you have set the desired sweep time, press SWEEP TIME or make another menu selection.

To access the Analog Sweep Trigger menu from this menu, press TRIGGER. Set one of three trigger modes:

- Auto
- External
- Single

The trigger modes are described on in "Sweep TRIGGER TYPES" on page 3-20.

Trigger Menu

The sweep trigger is selectable from the trigger menu. There are three modes of sweep triggering for analog and step frequency sweep—automatic, external, and single. Press the TRIGGER button to display the trigger types:

- Auto (Automatic): The sweep continually sweeps from its start frequency to its stop frequency with optimal retrace time.
- External: The sweep recurs when triggered by an external TTL-compatible clock pulse to the rear panel AUX I/O connector.
- **Single:** A single sweep starts when the trigger key is pressed. If a sweep is in progress when the key is pressed, it aborts and resets.




Figure 3-10. TRIGGER Menu

To access the Sweep Trigger menu (Figure 3-10) from either the Analog Sweep or Step Sweep menus, press: $SWEP \mid TRIGGER$


A message showing the sweep trigger mode selected appears on the right side of frequency title bar.

If you select the single sweep trigger mode, the menu display adds the menu soft key TRIGGER. Pressing TRIGGER starts a single sweep. If a single sweep is in progress, pressing TRIGGER causes the sweep to abort and reset.

The STEP RANGE menu provides frequency parameter range settings fro analog and step sweep modes. The RANGE menu is shown in Figure 3-14.

3-8 Frequency Step Sweep Operation

In step sweep frequency mode, the output frequency changes in discrete, synthesized steps between the selected start and stop frequencies. Step sweeps can start from a low frequency to a high frequency or from a high frequency to a low frequency. The sweep width can be set from 0.001 Hz to the full frequency range of the instrument. The step size or number of points between the sweep start and stop frequencies, the step dwell time, and sweep trigger are controllable from the SWEEP main menus.

In linear step sweep, the sweep is linearly incremented (or decremented) by the step size from the start frequency to the stop frequency. Two ways to set the size of each step of the linear step sweep:

- 1. Set the step size: The step size frequency range is 9 kHz to the full frequency range of the instrument.
- **2.** Set the number of points: The number of points range is 2 to 65535.

If the step size does not divide into the frequency range, the last step is truncated.

In logarithmic step sweep, step size increases logarithmically with the frequency and is determined by a logarithmic curve between the sweep start and stop frequencies and the number of points. The number of points ranges from 2 to 65535.

SWEEP Menu

The SWEEP menu provides broad (full range) and narrow band sweep parameters across the frequency range of the signal generator as well as power level sweep parameters for CW frequencies and swept frequencies.



SUMMARY Menu

The SUMMARY Menu provides the MG362x1A Sweep On or Off status for Step Sweep, List Sweep, and Level Sweep, and Analog Sweep. Note the status bar displays CW when the Sweep menus are all off. Once a sweep menu is selected, the status bar will display the sweep that is selected.

Press the sweep status bar to display the sweep menu as shown in Figure 3-12.



Editing the Current Start/Stop Frequencies

To edit the current frequency sweep range, open either the start or stop frequency parameter field. In the display shown in Figure 3-13, press START opens the start frequency parameter. Press STOP opens the stop frequency parameter. Edit the open frequency parameters. When complete, close the open parameter using a termination key. These are set as the start and stop frequencies for the sweep.

Setting the Step Size

Press STEP SIZE to open the step size parameter.

Open the parameter you wish to change, then edit the current value using the cursor control keys, the rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the key pad and appropriate termination soft key. When you have finished setting the open parameter, close it by pressing its menu soft key or make another menu selection.

In STEP SWEEP, the sweep is linearly incremented (or decremented) by the step size beginning with the start frequency to the stop frequency. There are two ways to set the size of each step of the linear step sweep.

Set the step size or set the number of points. The step size range is 9 kHz to the full frequency range of the instrument. When the step DWELL TIME, STEP SIZE, or NUMBER OF POINTS is set, the sweep time equals:

Step Dwell time × Number of Points + total phase-locking time for all the step frequencies.

Press the STEP SIZE button to open the step size parameter. Edit the open frequency parameter. When complete, close the open parameter using a termination key.

Note

The Step Size and Number of Points parameters are coupled values and change when either value is changed. When a coupled parameter value changes, its text color changes to blue.

Number of Points

Sets the number of points in a stepped frequency sweep or stepped power sweep. Points and step are coupled values. Entering the value for one will cause the other to be recalculated per the following formula:

points = (span / step) + 1

Entering a new value or either parameter will not change the span. An error will be generated if the points entered results in a calculated step size less than the minimum resolution for a stepped frequency sweep or a stepped power level sweep. An error will also be generated if the entered step size results in the number of points exceeding its maximum.

Setting the NUMBER OF POINTS (Number of Steps)

The number of points range is 2 to 65535. If the step size does not divide into the frequency range, the last step is truncated. When the step Dwell Time, Step Size, or Number of points is set:

sweep time = Step Dwell time × Number of Points + total phase-locking time for all step frequencies.

Press the NUMBER OF POINTS button to open the step size parameter. Edit the open frequency parameter and close the open parameter using a termination key.

Note

The Step Size or the Number of Points parameters are coupled values and may change dynamically to accommodate the setup. When a parameter changes, its text color changes to blue.

Setting DWELL TIME

The dwell-time-per-step of the step sweep can be set for any time in the range of 10 µs to 99 s. When dwell-time-per-step, step size or number of points is set, the sweep time equals dwell-time-per-step times the number of points plus the total phase-locking time for all the step frequencies. If sweep time is set, then dwell-time-per-step is the result of the sweep time divided by the number of points.

The dwell time of the step sweep can be set for any time in the range of $10 \mu s$ to 99 s. When the step Dwell Time, Step Size, or Number of Points is set:

Sweep time = Step Dwell time × Number of Points + total phase-locking time for all step frequencies.

Press the DWELL TIME button to open the dwell time parameter. Edit the open frequency parameter. When you complete, close the open parameter using a termination key.

Setting SWEEP DIRECTION

Sets the direction of the sweep as forward or reverse.

Up: Forward Sweep. Initiates the frequency sweep from the start frequency to stop frequency direction.

Down: Reverse Sweep. Initiates the frequency sweep from the stop frequency to start frequency direction.

Setting PRESET SWEEP RANGE

To set the sweep range frequency parameters:

Press: SWEEP | STEP | PRESET SWEEP RANGE.S

The Sweep Range menu is shown in Figure 3-14.


- Press F1-F2: Provides a frequency sweep between the start frequency, F1, and the stop frequency, F2.
- **Press F3-F4:** Provides a frequency sweep between the start frequency, F3, and the stop frequency, F4.
- **Press F5-DF:** Provides a symmetrical frequency sweep about the center frequency, F5. The sweep width is determined by the dF frequency parameter.
- **Press F6-DF**: Provides a symmetrical frequency sweep about the center frequency, F6. The sweep width is determined by the dF frequency parameter. The Delta Frequency can be applied to any F0 F9 frequency.

Press a preset sweep range parameters as F1 -F2, F3-F4, F5-F6 and DF (Delta Frequency).

Setting SWEEP TYPE

Set the type of stepped frequency sweep as Linear or Logarithmic:

Linear: The frequency sweep is linearly incremented by the step size from the start frequency to the stop frequency. The size of each step is set using the STEP SIZE or NUMBER OF POINTS.

Logarithmic: Step size increases logarithmically with frequency and is determined by a logarithmic curve fitted between the sweep start/stop frequencies. The number of steps is set using the NUMBER OF POINTS.







Figure 3-16. Press Sweep Trigger

To initiate a Manual Sweep:

In manual sweep frequency mode, TRIGGER POINT button is displayed. Trigger Point is described in section "TRIGGER SWEEP/TRIGGER POINT" on page 3-44. The output frequency can be manually tuned in phase-locked steps between the selected start and stop frequencies using the cursor control keys or rotary data knob. 3-10 LIST Menu

LIST sweep is a step sweep of preset frequency and level pairs. The pairs are defined in separate frequency and power levels. Sweeping in accomplished by defining start and stop indexes. List Mode provides two settings for creating a sweep:

- Points: The number of points (steps) per sweep parameter.
- Sweep: Set the sweep per point dwell time.

SWEEP LIST Index

The Sweep list index (0 through 3999) contains frequency/power level settings compiled into a list. Each frequency can have a different power level setting. The list sweep is defined by a list start index and list stop index. The list of up to 4000 frequency/power level sets is stored in non-volatile RAM to preserve any settings after the instrument is powered off. The list is not stored with the other setup information in the instrument.

The types of trigger modes available are described in "Sweep TRIGGER TYPES" on page 3-20.

When automatic, external, or single trigger mode is selected, the output sweeps between the specified list start and stop indexes, dwelling at each list index for the specified dwell time.

Selecting LIST from the SWEEP menu displays the menu shown in Figure 3-19. When the LIST SWEEP button is toggled on, the status bars displays List Sweep - Single. Note that the sweep displayed at the status bar is dependent on the sweep selected in the TRIGGER menu. See "LIST TRIGGER Menu" on page 3-24.




Figure 3-18. LIST TRIGGER - Set to Manual Sweep





LIST TRIGGER Menu

When manual trigger mode is selected, the list start index, list stop index, and dwell time parameter are not used. Instead, the list index is incremented or decremented by using the front panel cursor control keys. In manual trigger mode, the list index can also be incremented by using an external trigger input. Each trigger increments the list index by one.

After a reset, the list sweep defaults to manual trigger mode. The data display shows the trigger mode, list index, current frequency, and current power level. The list index specifies the current location within the list. When automatic, external, or single trigger mode is selected, the data display changes to show the trigger mode and list sweep start and stop index values only. 

The LIST LIST MENU provides a list index that identifies each frequency/power level set in the list. The list sweep menu consists of a 4000 (0 to 3999) rows of listed start index and stop index. Scroll through the list and edit the paired frequencies and power levels. Use the cursor control keys to select a frequency or power level from the list.

The LIST menu is shown in Figure 3-21.

Press: SWEEP | LIST | LIST



INSERT: Select the index number of the frequency and level pair. Enabled only in manual trigger source.

DELETE: Selects the sweep start index. Enabled in all trigger modes.

EDIT FREQ: Selects the sweep stop index. Enabled in all trigger modes.

▲ or ▼: Scroll up or down per row.

Press page up (blue double-up arrow) to scroll the displayed frequencies/levels to the previous page in the list. Press page down (blue double-down arrow) to scroll the displayed frequencies/levels to the next page in the list.

Select the index row (highlighted list index) and press either the EDIT FREQ or EDIT LEVEL button to edit the open parameter. Edit the open parameter using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the keypad and appropriate termination.

The complete list of 4000 (0-3999) index values remain as part of the list. Generally, a list sweep starts with list index 0 and stops at the index number of desired frequency steps, which may be less than index number. Each list index can also be individually edited from the List Setup and List Type menus.

Editing the Current LIST

Press LIST to open the current index parameter field for editing. Edit the current index using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the keypad. Press the Enter button when complete to close the annotated parameter window.

Press the EDIT FREQ menu button to open the index frequency parameter field for editing. Edit the current list frequency using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the keypad. When finished setting the open parameter, close it by selecting a termination key.

Editing the Current INDEXED LEVEL

Press the EDIT LEVEL menu button to open the index frequency parameter field for editing. Edit the current list level using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the keypad. When finished setting the open parameter, close it by selecting a termination key.




Figure 3-22. Set Up a List

Copy to the LIST

An easy method of entering frequency and power level information into the current list index is to copy the set parameters from the CW menu.




Figure 3-23. COPY TO LIST

From the main FREQUENCY menu, press the FREQUENCY and LEVEL to edit the parameters. Then press the COPY TO LIST button shown in Figure 3-23 to open the list index parameter. Once the frequency and power level information has been entered into the current list index, the list index is incremented by one.

Open the parameter you wish to change, then edit the current value using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the key pad and appropriate termination soft key. When you have finished setting the open parameter, close it by pressing its menu soft key or by making another menu selection.

Frequency Multiplier

The MG362x1A's RF output can be phase shifted. The phase offset range is -360° to +360° (±0.1°).

Note

The phase offset function is available in the CW operating mode only. The phase offset is always active and is a relative value compared to the current phase offset display.

To edit the phase offset setup, press:

FREQUENCY | MULTIPLIER




Figure 3-24. FREQUENCY MULTIPLIER Menu

The MULTIPLIER menu is shown in Figure 3-24.

The phase offset value is always active, but may or may not be displayed on the screen.

Editing Phase Offset

To edit phase offset, press:

FREQUENCY | PHASE | EDIT OFFSET

Edit the current offset value using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the keypad and termination button. Click outside the active window or click a terminator to close.

The phase offset value may be zeroed. Adjusting the phase offset zero display does not affect the phase shift of the RF output. This allows you to normalize the phase offset display as appropriate.

Set ZERO to zero the phase offset display from the phase offset menu, press:

FREQUENCY | PHASE | ZERO

Sets the displayed offset value to 0.0°.

Frequency Scaling

This menu provides a reference multiplier value setting to apply to all frequency parameters. The reference multiplier can be any value between 0.1 and 14. Changing the multiplier value changes the entered and displayed frequencies, but does not affect the output of the signal generator. For example:

Frequency scaling set to 4 CW frequency set to 20 GHz MG362x1A output is 5 GHz (20 GHz ÷ 4)

Note Resetting the MG362x1A sets the frequency scaling reference multiplier value to 1.

Press MULTIPLIER to open the reference multiplier parameter, then edit the current value using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the data entry key pad and the terminator soft key. To close the open multiplier parameter, press MULTIPLIER or make another menu selection.

3-11 Power Level Operations

The following paragraphs describe how to place the signal generator in fixed (non-swept) power level mode, select a power level for output, and activate level offset. Power level operations can consist of a single CW power level change, swept power level changes, to an ALC mode of operation—internal or fixed gain (ALC off). In addition, the signal generator provides a decouple function that allows decoupling of the step attenuator from the level setting.

You can select the ALC mode of operation as internal or fixed gain (ALC off). In addition, the signal generator provides a decouple function that allows decoupling of the step attenuator (if equipped) from the level setting.




Figure 3-25. Level Menu

Edit the CW Power Level

To select a CW power level for output, edit the current power level, enter a new power level, or select one of the preset level parameters from the PRESET menu. Set MG362x1A in the CW level mode from the main menu:

Press: FREQUENCY | LEVEL

or

Press the LEVEL field in the display. The edit window is displayed as shown in Figure 3-4. Enter and new CW power level or edit the current power level using the cursor control keys, the rotary data knob, or the front panel keypad and the appropriate terminator button. If a parameter was selected in error and no editing is required, click outside the active window or click a terminator to close.

Once a CW power level has been entered into the field, press a terminator button and then press outside the edit window to show the power level in the LCD display as shown in Figure 3-5.




Figure 3-26. Power Level Entry




Figure 3-27. Power Level Entered




Figure 3-28. LEVEL SETUP Menu

RF LEVEL LIMIT: Sets the maximum power level when level limit state is enabled. Range is -130 dBm to 33 dBm with Option 2. Range is -20 to 33 dBm without Option 2.

RF LEVEL LIMIT STATE: When ON, the level status area displays "Limit" or "Lim".

UNITS: Level units, select dBm, dBµV, mV.

DELTA-F RF: Toggle that controls RF On or Off during frequency switching in CW, Step sweep, and list sweep modes. Toggle Retrace RF Output protection On turns Delta-F RF Off.

BLANKING POLARITY: Selects the polarity of the signal that turns the RF on during pulse modulation, as follows:

Normal: specifies positive-true operation; a TTL-high level will turn on the RF output signal.

Inverted: specifies negative-true operation; a TTL-low level will turn on the RF output signal.

RETRACE RF: Controls the RF output On/Off during retraces. Toggling retrace RF Output protection On turns RF Off during retrace.

Setting RF LEVEL LIMIT




Figure 3-29. RF Level Limit State

RF LEVEL LIMIT sets the maximum power level when RF Level Limit State is enabled. The RF limit shown in Figure 3-29 shows the RF Limit Level State toggled on and the maximum achievable RF power level limit clamped to +5 dBm. In this example, the power level settings may be entered at a higher power level value, but the power output will remain at +5dBm until the RF Level Limit State is toggled off.




Figure 3-30. LEVEL SETUP Units Menu




Figure 3-32. FREQUENCY Menu




Figure 3-33. LEVEL Menu





Figure 3-35. Level PRESETS Menu

LEVEL OFFSET Menu

The Level OFFSET menu provides a means to compensate for a test device on the signal generator's RF output at a point of interest. For example, the power level at the test device may be less or more than the displayed power level because of the loss through an external transmission line or the gain of an amplifier located between the MG362x1A RF output and the test device. Using the level offset function, you can apply a constant to the displayed power level that compensates for this loss or gain. The displayed power level will then reflect the actual power level at the test device. The OFFSET menu provides power level adjustment for a device on the signal generator's output. 


Figure 3-37. Edit Level Offset




Figure 3-38. Level Offset On


3-12 Power Level Sweep Operation

The signal generator provides leveled output power sweeps at CW frequencies and in conjunction with frequency sweeps. Power level sweeps can be from a set to sweep from high level to a low level range or from a low to a high level range. Power level sweeps can be selected to be linear or logarithmic. Level sweep menus provide the sweep range, the step size, the dwell time-per-step, and the type of power sweep (linear or logarithmic), sweep direction, and sweep trigger.

Setting CW Power Sweep, Step Size, and Dwell Time

To set the size of each step of the CW power sweep, set the step size or set the number of steps. The step size range is 0.01 dB (Log) or 0.001 mV (Linear) to 163 dB; the number of steps range is 1 to 10,000. The dwell time-per-step of the CW power sweep can be set for any time in the range of 1 ms to 99 sec. If the sweep crosses a step attenuator setting, there will be a sweep dwell of approximately 20 ms to allow setting of the step attenuator.

- Press DWELL TIME to open the dwell time-per-step parameter.
- Press STEP SIZE to open the step size parameter.






Figure 3-41. Level Sweep Trigger Types




Figure 3-42. TRIGGER SWEEP Button





Figure 3-43. TRIGGER POINT Button




Figure 3-45. SWEEP LEVEL SETUP Menu

3-13 Setting the ALC Control

The Automatic Level Control (ALC) system is a feedback power level control system. An ALC system controls the amplitude and power level of the RF output. The output power is measured at an internal detector and compared with the expected power level. If the output and desired power levels do not equal, the ALC adjusts the power level until they are equal. The output power can also be set to a fixed level without using the normal feedback (ALC off).

This menu provides manual setting of the ALC Range for External Closed and Open Fixed Loops. This setting is used to configure particular ALC HW for either a High or Low user requested ALC range configuration. See "Setting LEVEL DAC" on page 3-49.

3-14 ALC Menu




Figure 3-46. ALC Loop Control Menu

You can select the ALC mode of operation—internal or fixed gain (ALC off). In addition, the signal generator provides a decouple function that allows decoupling of the step attenuator (if equipped) from the level setting. The ALC LOOP CONTROL settings menu is shown in Figure 3-46.

ALC Level Modes

Press the ALC Loop Control SOURCE button shown in Figure 3-46 to access the ALC leveling modes. Press: ALC | LOOP CONTROL | SOURCE.

Setting Internal Leveling

This is the normal default leveling mode. Output power is sensed by the MG362x1A's internal detector. The detector output signal is fed back to the ALC circuitry to adjust the output power level. Internal ALC is selected from the leveling menu.

To select internal ALC, press Internal. Pressing one of the other leveling menu soft keys External Detector or Fixed Gain will turn off internal leveling.

Setting External Leveling

In external leveling, the output power from the MG362x1A is detected by an external detector or power meter. The signal from the detector or power meter is returned to the ALC circuitry via the rear panel EXT ALC IN connector. The ALC adjusts the output power to keep the power level constant at the point of detection. To select the external ALC input from an external detector, press ALC | SOURCE External.

Setting Fixed Gain

In the fixed gain mode, the ALC is disabled. The RF level DAC and step attenuator (if installed) are used to control the relative power level. Power is not detected at any point and the absolute power level is uncalibrated. After fixed gain mode is selected, the attenuator (if installed) is decoupled and the RF level DAC value is displayed.

ALC Power Slope

The ALC power slope function lets you compensate for system, cable, and waveguide variations due to changes in frequency. This is accomplished by linearly increasing or decreasing power output as the frequency increases. 


Figure 3-47. ALC Power Slope Example


3-15 Step Attenuator (Option 2)

With step attenuators, the ALC and attenuator work in conjunction to provide leveled output power to -110 dB. In the normal (coupled) leveling mode, when the desired power level is set, the correct combination of ALC level and attenuator setting is determined by the instrument firmware. In some applications, such as receiver sensitivity testing, it is desirable to control the ALC level and attenuator setting separately by decoupling the step attenuator from the ALC.

ATTENUATOR Menu

In MG362x1A signal generators equipped with Option 2 step attenuators, the ALC and attenuator work in conjunction to provide leveled output power range of –130 dB. 


Figure 3-49. Attenuator Menu




Figure 3-50. Attenuation Ranges






Figure 3-52. ALC Power Slope




Figure 3-53. ALC LOOP CONTROL Menu




Figure 3-54. USER CAL SETUP Menu

The User Cal (user power level flatness calibration) function provides a means to compensate for path variations with frequency that are caused by external switching, amplifiers, couplers, mixers, multipliers, dividers, and cables in the test setup. This is done by means of an entered power-offset table from a GPIB power meter or calculated data. When user level flatness calibration is activated, the set power level is delivered at the point in the test setup where the calibration was performed. This "flattening" of the test point power level is accomplished by summing a power-offset word (from the power-offset table) with the signal generator's normal power level DAC word at each frequency point.

Up to five user level flatness calibration power-offset tables from 2 to 801 frequency points-per-table can be created and stored in the MG362x1A memory for recall.




Figure 3-55. Equipment Setup for Creating a Power-Offset Table

To create a power-offset table for user level flatness calibration, connect the equipment (shown in Figure 3-55) as follows:

- 1. Using a GPIB cable, connect the power meter to the MG362x1A
- **2.** Calibrate the power meter and the power sensor.
- 3. Connect the power sensor to the point in the test setup where the corrected power level is desired.




Figure 3-56. System Remote Menu




Figure 3-57. Sweep Setup Menu




Figure 3-58. ALC User Table

Erasing the Power-Offset Tables from Memory

The power-offset tables are stored in non-volatile memory. A master reset is required to erase the contents of the tables and reprogram them with default data.

Note

The master reset function overwrites all information stored in the non-volatile memory with default values. This includes the nine stored front panel setups and the table of 2000 frequency/power level sets used for list sweep mode.

To perform a master reset, press: SYSTEM | RESET | SYSTEM RESET | MASTER RESET

The contents of non-volatile memory have now been erased and reprogrammed with default data.

3-18 Modulation

The signal generator provides Amplitude Modulation (AM), Frequency Modulation (FM), Phase Modulation (Φ M), and Pulse Modulation (PM) of the output signal using modulating signals from either the internal AM, FM, Φ M, and pulse generators or external sources that are TTL-compatible. FM and Φ M can not be on at the same time; therefore, only the AM, FM or Φ M, and Pulse Modulation modes can be active simultaneously. The following paragraphs provide descriptions and operating instructions for each modulation mode.

Note

Your modulation capabilities are dependent on the instrument's installed options. The following descriptions and procedures are presented to cover all of the possible instrument configurations.

- "Amplitude Modulation"
- "Frequency Modulation" on page 3-68
- "Phase Modulation" on page 3-74
- "Pulse Modulation" on page 3-78

3-19 Amplitude Modulation

The Amplitude Modulation menu provides amplitude modulation of the output signal using a modulating signal from both the internal AM generator and an external source. The signal generator has two AM operating modes: Linear AM and Log AM. In Linear AM mode, sensitivity is continuously variable from 0 %/V to 100 %/V. The amplitude of the RF output changes linearly as the AM input changes. In Log AM mode, sensitivity is continuously variable from 0 dB/V to 25 dB/V. The amplitude of the RF output changes exponentially as the AM input changes.

Setting AM SOURCE


Press SOURCE to set the source of the modulating signal as Internal or External.

- Internal sets the modulating signal to the internal generator source.
- External sets the modulating signal to an external generator source connected to the rear panel AM IN BNC.

Amplitude Modulation Set to Internal




Figure 3-60. AM Modulation WAVEFORM Menu








Figure 3-63. FM Filter




Figure 3-64. Frequency Modulation Waveforms










Figure 3-68. Phase Wave Selection










Figure 3-72. Pulse Count




Figure 3-73. Pulse Mode




Figure 3-74. Trigger Mode Menu

Triggered: The pulse generator is triggered by an external trigger to produce Single, Doublet, Triplet, or Quadruplet pulse modulation waveforms. Pulse delay is not available in this trigger mode.

Trigger with Delay: The pulse generator is triggered by an external trigger to produce Single, Doublet, Triplet, or Quadruplet pulse modulation waveforms delayed by pulse delay.

Composite: An external pulse triggers the internal pulse generator and also pulse modulates the output signal. The internal pulse generator produces a single pulse 'delayed by pulse delay1 which also pulse modulates the output signal.

Polarity

Press POLARITY to select the polarity of the signal that turns the RF on during pulse modulation, as follows:

Normal: Specifies positive-true operation; a TTL-high level will turn on the RF output signal.

Inverted: Specifies negative-true operation; a TTL-low level will turn on the RF output signal.





Figure 3-75. Modulation Waveforms

Phase tracking enables up to three MG362x1A units to phase track with a very high degree of stability. Phase tracking provides the following additional rear panel connectors to link internal reference signals together:

- 100 MHz Reference Output: Provides the reference signal to drive up to two other MG362x1A instruments.




Figure 3-77. Phase Tracking Connections of Multiple MG362X1A Instruments

- 100 MHz Reference Input: Accepts the 100 MHz reference signal from another MG362x1A. To enable two MG362x1A instruments to phase track with high stability, connect the instruments as shown in Figure 3-77 using 50 Ω BNC cables and a 50 Ω BNC Tee:

The 100 MHz loopback must be connected on the reference synthesizer as shown. The above adjustment of phase will work successfully when generators are set to the same frequency or frequencies that are harmonically related. The frequencies must be set in advance of making all the adjustments of phase and if the frequencies are subsequently changed, then the process of phase adjustment must be repeated.

Once connected as shown in Figure 3-77, connect an oscilloscope channel to each of the RF outputs from the signal generators to display the initial phase difference between the RF signals. Use the "Phase Offset Menu" on page 3-5, adjust the phase offset of one of the units to achieve the desired phase relationship as shown on the oscilloscope. Once the desired phase relationship has been achieved, the Phase Offset value may be zeroed. 

Erasing Stored Setups

The front panel setups are stored in non-volatile memory. A Factory Reset is required to erase the contents of the setups and reprogram them with default data.

Note

The Factory Reset function overwrites all information stored in the non-volatile memory with default values. This includes the table of 2000 frequency/power level sets used for the list sweep mode and the five power-offset tables used for the user level flatness correction function.

To perform a Reset All






Figure 3-80. 100 MHz Calibration Dialog





Figure 3-81. 10 MHz Calibration Dialog









Selecting a narrower bandwidth provides greater immunity from reference related phase noise; however, reference tracking will not be optimal. Selecting a wider bandwidth increases phase tracking of the external reference; however, it also increases the susceptibility to reference noise.

To select an external reference loop bandwidth, first connect the external $10\,\mathrm{MHz}$ reference signal to the MG362x1A rear panel 10 MHz REF IN connector.

After selecting the external reference loop bandwidth, the setting is shown in the Configure Rear Panel menu.

Note MG362x1A phase noise specifications apply only when an external reference is not connected.




Figure 3-87. Configure Front Panel Menu




Figure 3-88. Configure Rear Panel Menu

Press < Previous to return to the System Configuration menu display.

Configuring the RF

Configuring the RF of the MG362x1A involves the following:

- Selecting RF on or off during retrace
- Selecting RF on or off during frequency switching in CW, step sweep, and list sweep modes
- Selecting whether a sweep triggered by a single or external trigger should rest at the top or bottom of the sweep ramp
- Selecting RF on or off at reset

- Setting the reference multiplier value for frequency scaling
- Selecting 40 dB or 0 dB of attenuation when RF is switched off (units with a step attenuator, Option 2, installed)

To access the Configure RF menu from the System Configuration menu, press RF.

Press Retrace RF to select RF on [RT1] or off [RT0] during retrace. The display will reflect your selection.

Press Delta-F RF to select RF on [RC1] or off [RC0] during frequency switching in CW, step sweep, and list sweep modes. The display will reflect your selection.

Press Ramp Rest to select 0 or 10 for the ramp rest point for sweeps that are triggered by a single trigger or external trigger. 0 indicates that the sweep will rest at the bottom of the sweep ramp; 10 indicates that the sweep will rest at the top of the sweep ramp. The display will reflect your selection.

Press Reset State to select RF on [RO0] or off [RO1] at reset. The display will reflect your selection.

Press More > to access the additional Configure RF menu for more selections.

Frequency Scaling

Set a reference multiplier value and apply it to all frequency parameters. The reference multiplier can be any value between 0.1 and 18. Changing the multiplier value changes the entered and displayed frequencies, but does not affect the output of the signal generator. For example:

Frequency scaling set to 4 CW frequency set to 20 GHz MG362x1A output is 5 GHz (20 GHz ÷ 4)

Note Resetting the MG362x1A sets the frequency scaling reference multiplier value to 1.

Press Frequency Scaling [FRS] to open the reference multiplier parameter, then edit the current value using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the data entry key pad and the terminator soft key. To close the open multiplier parameter, press Frequency Scaling or make another menu selection. Terminate RF Off

Press Terminate RF Off [TR1] to select 40 dB (minimum) of attenuation when RF is switched off in units with a step attenuator (Option 2) installed. This provides a better output source match. The display will reflect Yes to indicate the 40 dB of attenuation is applied. Press Terminate RF Off [TR0] again to select 0 dB of attenuation when RF is switched off. The display will reflect No to indicate 0 dB of attenuation is applied.

Note The Terminate RF Off selection is only available in units with Option 2 (Step Attenuator).

Press < Previous to return to the main Configure RF menu display.INCREMENT Menu

The INCREMENT menu provides an increment setting size for editing frequency and power level. The increment feature is a GUI function and affects only the Instrument UI or the remote UI.

Press: SYSTEM | INCREMENT

Increment Size


Set the incremental size for editing CW frequencies and fixed power level. When the increment mode is set to on, these parameter values will increase or decrease by the set amount each time the front panel

 \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown pad is pressed or the rotary data knob is turned clockwise or counter-clockwise. This menu also lets you turn the increment mode on and off.

Open a parameter to be changed, then edit the current value using the cursor control keys, rotary data knob, or enter a new value using the key pad and appropriate termination key. 


Figure 3-90. Configure GPIB More >




Figure 3-91. Configure GPIB Emulation >



Chapter 4 — Operation Verification

4-1 Introduction

This chapter contains three operation verification tests that can be used to verify the Series MG362x1A RF/Microwave signal generator operation. Setup instructions and performance procedures are included for each test. The results can be compared with the specified limits that are shown on the test record forms that are provided for each test.

The tests in this operation manual are designed to verify that the signal generator is operating correctly and are not designed to verify performance to published specifications.

Note

Specifications shown in this chapter and in other chapters are for reference only. Refer to the performance specifications for the MG362x1A found in the technical data sheet. Anritsu part number: 11410-00928.

4-2 Test Records

Table 4-1, Table 4-2, and Table 4-3 contain test record forms that can be photocopied and used to record the results of operational verification tests of your MG362x1A. These tables are included as part of the operational verification test procedures and contain test information for all MG362x1A models.

4-3 Initial MG362x1A Checkout

Before starting the operation verification tests in this chapter, perform an initial checkout of the MG362x1A to be tested. This initial checkout consists of applying power to the signal generator, verifying that it passes self test, and resetting it to the factory default parameters.

Power On

Connect the MG362x1A to the power source. Toggle the rear panel AC input connector switch to the ON position. Press the front panel power button. This automatically places the signal generator in operation (front panel power on LED button turns green). During power-on, the signal generator loads its operating program, and then returns to the specified power on setup file.

Warm-up Time

Power on the MG362x1A and allow at least one hour of warm-up time before performing operational verification testing. This will ensure stable operation of the instrument.

Self Test

Next, perform a self test of the MG362x1A to ensure proper operation of the instrument's internal assemblies. To perform a self test, press the 3-Line Icon| DIAGNOSTICS | SELF TEST. See "SELF TEST" on page 2-42. Error conditions detected during self test must be corrected before continuing.

4-4 Presetting the MG362x1A

The signal generator should be preset to the factory-selected default parameters before continuing operation and verification testing. Factory Reset clears the current setup parameters. If these parameter values are needed for future testing, save them as a stored setup before presetting the signal generator.

Press: 3-Line Icon | FILES. Name the setup file to be saved and press SAVE.




Figure 4-1. Reset Menu

To access the RESET ALL menu shown in Figure 4-1 and set to factory default:

Press: SYSTEM | RESET | SYSTEM RESET | RESET ALL

or

Press: 3-Line Icon | SETTINGS | RESET | RESET ALL

4-5 Frequency Synthesis Test

The following test verifies that the CW frequency output of the MG362x1A under test is within tolerance. Table 4-1 contains a standard test record that you can copy and use to record test results for this test.

The following procedure tests the tolerance of the CW frequency output.

- 1. Connect the equipment shown in Figure 4-2 as follows:
 - **a.** Connect the MG362x1A rear panel 10 MHz REF OUT to the Frequency Counter 10 MHz External Reference input.
 - **b.** Connect the MG362x1A RF OUTPUT to the Frequency Counter RF Input 1.
- **2.** Set up the MG362x1A as follows:
 - a. Upon preset, the FREQUENCY menu is displayed with frequency and set to default values.
 - b. Press FREQUENCY to open the current frequency parameter for editing.
 - **c.** Set the first test frequency in Table 4-1.
- **3.** Record the frequency counter reading on the test record and calculate the difference between the test frequency and the measured value.
- **4.** Verify that the calculated difference meets specifications.

Note The frequency counter reading is typically within ±1 Hz. Differences of a few hertz can be caused by noise or counter limitations. Differences of more than ±10 Hz indicate a frequency synthesis problem.

- **5.** Set FREQUENCY to the next test frequency.
- **6.** Record the frequency counter reading and calculate the difference between the test frequency and the measured value.
- 7. Repeat steps 5 and 6 until all of the test frequencies in Table 4-1 have been recorded.




Figure 4-3. Equipment Setup for Accuracy and Flatness Tests

The MG362x1A is capable of output s in excess of +20 dBm. Ensure that proper care is taken to protect sensitive power sensors from being damaged by using a fixed attenuator. **Do not** apply power above +19 dBm to the power sensor.

e. Set up the maximum V/GHz range by pressing:

Setup | StopF

and enter the maximum frequency of the MG362x1A.

- f. Press any hard key to begin the measurement.
- g. Calibrate the power meter with the power sensor.
- **2.** Connect the power sensor to the RF Output of the MG362x1A (use a fixed attenuator when measuring s above +19 dBm).

- **3.** Connect the special AUX I/O interface cable (Anritsu PN 806-97) to the MG362x1A rear panel AUX I/O connector. Connect the cable BNC connectors as follows:
 - **a.** Connect the cable labeled "SEQ SYNC" to the power meter rear panel INPUT 1 DIGITAL connector.
 - **b.** Connect the cable labeled "HORIZ OUT" to the power meter rear panel INPUT 2 ANALOG connector.

4-7 Accuracy Test Procedure

Power level accuracy is checked by stepping the power down in one dB increments from the maximum rated power.

- 1. Set up the MG362x1A as follows:
 - **a.** Reset the instrument by pressing 3-Line Icon | SETTINGS | RESET | FACTORT RESET. Upon preset, the FREQUENCY menu is displayed with frequency and set to default values.

Note

The accuracy test records are generic to all models and option configurations. Not all of the settings may apply to your specific model configuration. Start with the highest specified as indicated in the technical data sheet that was shipped with your instrument.

- b. Press FREQUENCY button to open the current frequency parameter for editing.
- **c.** Set the frequency to the CW frequency listed in Table 4-2.
- **d.** In the same menu screen, press the LEVEL button to open the current parameter for editing and set LEVEL to the maximum specified noted in the data sheet (use a fixed attenuator when measuring s above +19 dBm).
- **2.** Measure the output with the power meter and record the power meter reading on the test record (ensure that any fixed attenuation value is added to the reading).
- **3.** Verify that the measurement meets the specifications listed on the test record.
- **4.** Set LEVEL to the next test on the test record. Record the power meter reading on the test record and verify that it meets specification (ensure that any fixed attenuation value is added to the reading).
- 5. Repeat step 4 for the remaining s in Table 4-2 for the current CW frequency.
- **6.** Repeat steps 1 through 5 for all CW frequencies Table 4-2.

4-8 Flatness Test Procedure

Power flatness is checked by measuring the power level variation during a full band sweep in the step sweep mode.

- 1. Set up the MG362x1A as follows for a step sweep flatness test:
 - **a.** Reset the instrument by pressing 3-Line Icon | SETTINGS | RESET | RESET ALL. Upon reset, the FREQUENCY menu is displayed with frequency and set to default values.
 - b. Press FREQUENCY button to open the current frequency parameter for editing.
 - **c.** Set the frequency to the CW frequency in Table 4-2.
 - **d.** In the same menu screen, press the LEVEL button to open the current parameter for editing and set LEVEL to the maximum specified noted in the data sheet (use a fixed attenuator when measuring s above +19 dBm).
 - e. Press SWEEP | STEP to show the step sweep menu as shown below.




Figure 4-4. Step Sweep Setup Menu

- **f.** Set START to the lowest frequency of the instrument and set STOP to the highest frequency of the instrument for a full frequency sweep.
- g. Set the DWELL TIME to 1 second, or to a time that is comfortable between recordings.
- h. Set the NUMBER OF POINTS to 100.
- 2. Press the TRIGGER menu.
- **3.** Press TRIGGER SWEEP button to start a sweep.
- **4.** As the MG362x1A steps through the full frequency range, observe the maximum and minimum power meter readings and record the values on the test record. Verify that the variation (difference between the maximum and minimum readings) does not exceed the value noted in Table 4-3. The sweep may be repeated as necessary by pressing the TRIGGER button.

Appendix A — Software Installation

A-1 Install MG362x1A

The MG362x1A PC software provides remote access to a network connected instrument and displays the same MG362x1A user interface, instrument controls, and live measurement data on the computer screen. The software also allows you to load setup data from saved files.

Connecting to the localhost is like connecting to an instrument so there is no expectation of carrying over settings or trace data from one to the other. The localhost will include option controlled functionality with most options automatically enabled.

- Open GL (ES) 2.0 support




Figure A-1. MG362x1A Installation

A-2 FILE (File Management)

The PC file system is used for all file operations when connected to an instrument. The FILE menu buttons will display the Windows Save As or Recall File dialogs; the FILES system menu will launch Windows Explorer. Note that files cannot be recalled from nor written to a connected instrument.

- **2.** Verify the MG362x1A is connected to the network and has been given an IP address. See "SETTINGS Menu" on page 2-26.
- 3. Touch the front panel menu sequence as: 3-Line Menu | SYSTEM INFORMATION | SOFTWARE
- **4.** Touch the WEB UPDATES button to the on position as shown in Figure B-1 to automatically check the for Anritsu website for updates.




Figure B-1. Web Updates Button




Figure B-3. Software Update Dialog




Figure B-4. Software Update Progress Dialog

Appendix C — Software Option Upgrades

C-1 Introduction

To obtain a software option upgrade, the user will be required to save and send a configuration file of the MG362x1A to an Anritsu sales representative. Use the following procedure to export the MG362x1A configuration file and to import the options upgrade.

C-2 Upgrade Procedure

Upgrading software options on MG362x1A consists of two main steps:

- 1. Export and send the unit's configuration file to Anritsu.
- 2. Import the new license file provided by Anritsu

Exporting a Software Configuration File

Exporting the configuration file:

- 1. Insert a FAT-32 formatted USB memory device into the instrument. If using the remote GUI, insert the USB memory device into the PC.
- 2. Open the System menu from the upper left 3-bar icon.
- 3. Use the "OPTIONS Menu" on page 2-37 to save the instruments configuration file.
- 4. Navigate to Settings > Options menu.
- **5.** Touch SAVE CONFIG at the lower left of INSTALLED OPTIONS.
- **6.** Save the configuration file to a USB memory device, preserving the default filename. The filename will be in the format of MG362x1A_XXXXXXX.config on the USB drive when the operation is complete.
- 7. Email the file to your Anritsu Customer Service representative at: https://www.anritsu.com/contact-us.

Importing Software License

Importing a new license file:

- 1. After receiving a new license file from Anritsu, place the file on the USB memory device in the top (root) level. Not in any directory.
- 2. Insert the FAT-32 formatted USB memory device into the instrument. If using the remote GUI, insert the USB memory device into the PC.
- **3.** Open the System menu from the upper left 3-bar icon.
- 4. Navigate to Settings > Options menu
- 5. Touch ENABLE OPTIONS USING FILE at the lower right of INSTALLED OPTIONS.

The instrument GUI (or remote GUI) will search for a valid license file on the USB memory device and apply the changes to the system.

Reboot the instrument and ensure all changes are applied.
